DIRECTOR'S NOTES

"People always freak out when like, you know, like art forms move forward" -Sam

Like so many great works of art, The Flick is its own distinctive, perhaps even unique, genre. This makes it both a treat to experience, and difficult to write about. Annie Baker evades our need to categorize or lock stories into rigid types—and yet it doesn't sink into the murky waters of general, universal thematic washes—it is specific. I was not in small town Massachusetts in 2012, and yet this play speaks to a part of me that feels so authentic it is almost secret.

I first encountered Annie Baker's writing while understudying in her adaptation of Uncle Vanya at the Shaw Festival. Like Chekhov, the Flick works in similarly mysterious ways. It presents us with questions instead of answers, zooms in on the micro moments of life, without panning out to show us the larger picture. The answers are for after the credits roll.

The Flick might be a story about friendship. It might be a play about status. Above all it might be a play about art: how art forms--like theatre and film—evolve, how they survive, and how we commodify art into the stuff of the everyday. Set in in our not so distant past, a few hours south of us, Annie Baker's Pulitzer-prize winning play still rings true today, echoing across these Centaur theatre walls.



Rebecca Gibian - Director


Bruce Lambie - Lighting Design
